What Does the Bishop Do?

I am often asked a simple question: "What do you do as the Bishop?" That's sometimes difficult to answer. One of these days I'm going to chart an entire week of everything I do, or almost everything, to get a better handle on the reality

of the office but for now I've singled out a couple of items that will indicate how I spend my time from time to time.

Since the beginning of September of 2016 I have driven 11,980 miles in my car and flown an additional 3,925 miles by air, bringing the total miles travelled to 15,905 miles.

As the synod is rather large in geographic size there are often nights when I can't make it home for the night so I stay in area hotels or occasionally someone's home. In the same time frame as above I've spent 48 nights away from home, including Conference of Bishop Meetings, Academy of Bishops Meetings, preaching opportunities and countless other ministry moments.

I have preached and sometimes presided at twenty congregations in the synod. In those moments I have been blessed to get to know people a little bit, share some stories about the synod, offer a children's sermon about the Bishop's Crozier, aka Shepherds Staff, and answer questions that sometimes have answers but often don't.

I have been involved in over 126 meetings of various shapes and sizes from Boards to Councils to Teams to Committees to couples to individuals and everything in between.

Beyond that I have fielded an unknown number of phone calls, worked on sermons and presentations, written articles like this for publication, worked on planning the Rostered Ministers Gathering for this summer, joined the ELCA Church Council as the Region Seven Liaison Bishop and offered prayers at innumerable locations and times. Bishop's Confidential Recommendations are needed for Candidates seeking to enter the roster of the ELCA, letters to offer thanks or make inquiries or simply respond to requests are running and afloat along with a cadre of colleagues and hundreds of lay people who work and pray and hope to move this synod forward.

And all of this is gift and grace. The question I am asked the most is "How do you like your job?" My response is always the same, "I love this call 95% of the time. It has its moments but they are few and far between and are superseded by the good things that happen in this place."

Thanks for being a part of this endeavor we call Church. We are the Church together and better for it. I am extremely thankful for your partnership and the gifts you bring. Together we can bless the world with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. And, with the aid of the Holy Spirit? Watch out!!!!



Extremism Workgroup

In August 2016, Bishop John Macholz formed a workgroup to respond to an action of the 2016 Synod Assembly regarding religious extremism. Rather than dictate a specific course of action, the workgroup decided to divide their work into four areas and to provide resources that could help congregations grow in their awareness as well as build capacity for addressing this complex issue. The areas were:

- 1) Understanding the Relationship Between Religion and Extremism
- 2) Supporting the Global Christianity in Times and Places of Persecution
- 3) Engaging in Civil Discourse Around Difficult Social Issues
- 4) Fostering Interfaith Dialogue

As this workgroup finalizes their work, they will share the finished product through the Upstate Update. Both an online and pdf form of the resources will be made available. In addition, the workgroup is planning a workshop for Synod Assembly to give leaders further opportunity to engage in discussion and identify ways to introduce these topics in congregational settings.

Systems Academy Report

The Upstate New York Synod was one of the first synods to participate in the newly formed ELCA Systems Academy. Following his retirement, Rev. Gregory Tennermann accepted the role of Natural Systems Coordinator for the synod. In addition to participating in the Academy for four years, he has agreed to continue to consult with the Conflict and Healing Team, work with Intentional Interim Pastors, organize opportunities for leadership development around Bowen/Friedman Systems Theory, lead and train others to lead *Healthy Congregations* workshops, and identify coaches trained in systems theory. He is also available for consultations with congregations and their leaders in the synod.

In the past year, an upstate NY “mini-academy” has been gathered with participants from around the Synod. Deans and Synod staff were asked to nominate candidates for the academy, and 22 persons were invited to participate. The group has met twice with the goal of encouraging leaders to learn more about systems and to begin thinking in new ways about their leadership in the families, congregations and groups that they participate within. Also, the Conflict and Healing Team has spent significant time reviewing its process in light of systems training. They are also beginning to think about new ways that these skilled leaders can be resources to our congregations and their leaders.



Later this fall, Tennermann will be offering training for *Healthy Congregations* workshop leaders. He has been trained and certified by Healthy Congregations, Inc. to do this training to expand the pool of facilitators who can lead these workshops for congregations and other groups, presumably around our Synod.

It is hoped that as more persons become skilled systems thinkers, the church will be better equipped to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing world. Systems thinking is a strong tool for leaders to use as we are led by God’s Spirit into the future.
